CONFESSION OF SINS

PASTOR:

INTROIT: Psalm 66:1-3

Shout joyfully to God, all the earth, alleluia; sing a psalm to his name, alleluia; praise him with magnificence, alleluia, alleluia, alleluia. Say to God: "How awesome are your deeds, O Lord! In the greatness of your power, your enemies will be convicted of lying to you".

FIRST LESSON: Acts 2:14, 26-34

But Peter, standing with the eleven, lifted up his voice and addressed them: "Men of Judea and all who dwell in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and give ear to my words.

Let all the house of Israel therefore know for certain that God has made him both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified." Now when they heard this they were cut to the heart, and said to Peter and the rest of the apostles, "Brothers, what shall we do?" And Peter said to them, "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins, and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. For the promise is for you and for your children and for all who are far off, everyone whom the Lord our God calls to himself." And with many other words he bore witness and continued to exhort them, saying, "Save yourselves from this crooked generation." So those who received his word were baptized, and there were added that day about three thousand souls.

SECOND LESSON: 1 Peter 1:17-25

"And if you call on him as Father who judges impartially according to each one's deeds, conduct yourselves with fear throughout the time of your exile, knowing that you were ransomed from the futile ways inherited from your forefathers, not with perishable things such as silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without blemish or spot. He was foreknown before the foundation of the world but was made manifest in the last times for the sake of you who through him are believers in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so that your faith and hope are in God.

Having purified your souls by your obedience to the truth for a sincere brotherly love, love one another earnestly from a pure heart, since you have been born again, not of perishable seed but of imperishable, through the living and abiding word of God; for "All flesh is like grass and all its glory like the flower of grass. The grass withers, and the flower falls, but the word of the Lord remains forever." And this word is the good news that was preached to you.

HOLY GOSPEL: Luke 24:13-35

"That very day two of them were going to a village named Emmaus, about seven miles-from Jerusalem, and they were talking with each other about all these things that had happened. While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. And he said to them, "What is this conversation that you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. Then one of them, named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened, and they recognized him. And he vanished from their sight. They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?" And they rose that same hour and returned to Jerusalem. And they found the eleven and those who were with them gathered together, saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he was known to them in the breaking of the bread.

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SERMON: Walking with the Risen Christ

It was evening on the first day of the week when two disciples of Jesus were walking the seven miles back to their home town of Emmaus. While they were walking, Jesus joined them but they did not recognize Him. Maybe they were too preoccupied, with their shattered dreams, to recognize Him. The last time they had seen Him was when His lifeless body was being taken down from the cross. As Jesus joined them, He asked, "You seem to be in a deep conversation about something; what are you concerned about?" They stopped walking and one of them replied, "Haven't you heard, you must be the only one who hasn't heard what just happened in Jerusalem." "What things?" Jesus asked. The two disciples had possessed great hopes that Jesus was their long-expected Messiah. "We had thought he was the Messiah," they said, "But he was arrested and crucified. This is now the third day. His body is missing, but no one knows where the body went."

The two disciples had all the pieces, but could not put the puzzle together.

- they knew Jesus was a prophet, powerful in word and deed.
- they knew Jesus had been handed over, sentenced to death, and crucified.
- they knew that it was now the third day since all this had happened.
- they knew of the women's amazement, saying Jesus' tomb was empty and that angels had said that He was alive.
- they knew that some of their friends who went to the tomb, also found it empty, but they did not see Jesus.
- they knew that they had hoped he was the Redeemer of Israel.

When they put the pieces together, they made a dismal and gloomy picture. Their hopes were ruined. They thought their dreams had died.

But they were missing the bigger picture! The stranger (really Jesus) said to them, "How foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken!" The truth of the matter is, on our own, we are all spiritually blind and dead. Our sin separates us from God. We have become strangers to him. None of us, by our own ability, can believe what the prophets have spoken!

Some today are still living as if the Body of Jesus is still missing. They are living as if that were the end of the story. Jesus was born, arrested, crucified, died and was buried. Period. Finished. End of story.

These two followers of Jesus saw the end of all their hopes and dreams. But the Biblical account does not end with verse 24. It goes on to give us the rest of the story.

"And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" And beginning with Moses & all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself."

Wouldn't you have wanted to have been on that walk to Emmaus with Jesus? Imagine Jesus leading you in Bible study. He taught them the prophecy that the Messiah would "suffer all these things before entering his time of glory." He quoted Moses and the prophets explaining the Scripture to them, explaining what all said about himself.

"So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." So he went in to stay with them. When he was at table with them, he took the bread and blessed and broke it and gave it to them. Their eyes were opened & they recognized him. He vanished from their sight. They said to each other, "Did not our hearts burn within us while he talked to us on the road, while he opened to us the Scriptures?

Whenever there is a recognition of love, there is joy. Cleopas and his companion made a marvelous discovery that evening. They recognized the risen Lord. They recognized that He was with them. And this recognition brought joy to their lives. When we reach the point where we recognize God's love for us in Jesus Christ, we, too, are filled with an inner sense of happiness and peace.

Have you had some of your dreams shattered? Things you had hoped for that did not materialize? Have a little talk with Jesus. Ask Jesus to sit down with you and have a Bible study. Search the Scriptures until you find God's answer. Your heart will be strangely warmed. The poet William Blake wrote,

Unless the eye catch fire God will not be seen.
Unless the ear catch fire God will not be heard.
Unless the tongue catch fire God will not be named.
Unless the heart catch fire God will not be loved.
Unless the mind catch fire God will not be known.

The disciples reflected on their walk with Jesus, "Didn't our hearts feel strangely warm as he talked with us on the road and explained the Scriptures to us?" The two disciples recognized Jesus and had a complete turnaround in their attitude and outlook. THEIR HEARTS CAUGHT ON FIRE. They burned within them. They ran the seven miles back to Jerusalem. They had smiles on their faces and new energy in their steps.

Their gloom was transformed into excitement and joy. The resurrection of Jesus announces that where sin abounded, grace did much more abound. Easter announces that righteousness, decency and kindness are stronger than sin, human corruption and violence. The tomb is not only empty, but Jesus is alive.

As you walk the road of this life Jesus will join you and walk by your side. He has promised to never leave you nor forsake you.

We are not asked to believe the doctrine of the Resurrection. We are asked to meet this person raised from the dead.

John Wesley was an ordained clergyman in the Church of England. He tried many ways to find peace with God. He tried the way of reason, but after two years of studying various philosophies he did not find his answer. He then studied the writings of the mystics and pored over classic literature. He sought peace with God through religious exercise. He fasted three times a week and prayed two hours every morning, but did not find inner peace.

Then on May 24, 1738 he wrote in his journal. "In the evening, I went very unwillingly to a society in Aldersgate Street, where one was reading Luther's preface to the Epistle to the Romans. About a quarter before nine, when the teacher was describing the change which God works in the heart through faith in Christ, I felt my heart strangely warmed. I felt I did trust in Christ, Christ alone for salvation; and an assurance was given me that He had taken away my sins, even mine, and saved me from the law of sin and death."

At the end of John Wesley's life in 1791 there were 130,000 Methodists in England and a million Methodists in America. John Wesley was brought to faith by personally encountering Christ. And that is the work of the Spirit of God. Without the Holy Spirit, we are unable to receive input from God.

St. Paul wrote in I Corinthians 2:14, "The man without the Spirit does not accept the things that come from the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him, and he cannot understand them, because they are spiritually discerned."

Those two Emmaus disciples were touched by God's Spirit. Jesus opened them up to the Scriptures.

- He began with Moses and all the Prophets.
- He explained what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself.
- Afterwards they would say, "Were not our hearts burning within us?"

Jesus opened their eyes. When Jesus put the pieces together for them, they finally saw the "Big Picture." We all need our eyes opened to Jesus on a regular basis, just as those early disciples did.

In one church, there is a sign that is taped on the inside of the pulpit. It is in a place where only the Pastor can see it. It quoted the words of John 12:21, "Sir, we would like to see Jesus!" That's the work of those of us who know Jesus. To help other people see Him as well. The miracle of God is that Jesus is still revealed to the eyes of faith wherever & when-ever the Gospel is proclaimed. Jesus is no longer a stranger. He is a friend. He is our friend.

Jesus is a stranger to many people in the world today. But he is a stranger who wants to be a friend to them, too. In a way, to the unbelieving world, we who follow Christ are also like strangers!

It says in 1 Peter 1:17 and following, "...live your lives as strangers here in reverent fear. For you know that it was not with perishable things such as silver or gold that you were redeemed from the empty way of life handed down to you from your forefathers, but with the precious blood of Christ, a lamb without blemish or defect. He was chosen before the creation of the world, but was revealed in these last times for your sake."

We are different from the people of the world. We might look the same, but our words, actions, priorities, and attitudes give us away. Why do we stand out? Life without Christ is empty. Life with Christ has given us new meaning. It has given us a life of hope. It is a life lived knowing that he loves us and is with us every step of the way of life's journey, whether we see him or not!

As we rub shoulders with others along the way, the Holy Spirit still works through the Word of God to help them put the pieces together.

We live in difficult times – the Bible calls them the Last Times. While these are trying times, we have one important thing going for us: Jesus, chosen before the creation of the world to be our Redeemer, has now been revealed for our sakes. He has given us His Spirit who opens the Scriptures for us, who opens our eyes to see Jesus so that our "faith and hope are in God!" We recognize His voice as He speaks to us in His Word. We also recognize Him in the breaking of the bread whenever we celebrate His Supper.

Jesus was willing to stay with the Emmaus disciples. Through Baptism, He also willingly abides in us! Today we will go on our way as strangers in the world with heaven as our home. Our humble prayer is that others who do not yet see the "Big Picture" of who Jesus is and what He has done for us – those lost in the blindness of despair, emptiness and hopelessness – may more and more be able to recognize Him, our risen and victorious Savior, in us – in what we say and do. Amen!
