FIRST READING

Acts 1:12-26

Then [the apostles] returned to Jerusalem from the mount called Olivet, which is near Jerusalem, a Sabbath day's journey away. And when they had entered, they went up to the upper room, where they were staying, Peter and John and James and Andrew, Philip and Thomas, Bartholomew and Matthew, James the son of Alphaeus and Simon the Zealot and Judas the son of James. All these with one accord were devoting themselves to prayer, together with the women and Mary the mother of Jesus, and his brothers.

In those days Peter stood up among the brothers (the company of persons was in all about 120) and said, Brothers, the Scripture had to be fulfilled, which the Holy Spirit spoke beforehand by the mouth of David concerning Judas, who became a guide to those who arrested Jesus. For he was numbered among us and was allotted his share in this ministry." (Now this man bought a field with the reward of his wickedness, and falling headlong he burst open in the middle and all his bowels gushed out. And it became known to all the inhabitants of Jerusalem, so that the field was called in their own language Akeldama, that is, Field of Blood.) "For it is written in the Book of Psalms,

"'May his camp become desolate, and let there be no one to dwell in it'; and

"Let another take his office."

So one of the men who have accompanied us during all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John until the day when he was taken up from us—one of these men must become with us a witness to his resurrection." And they put forward two, Joseph called Barsabbas, who was also called Justus, and Matthias. And they prayed and said, "You, Lord, who know the hearts of all, show which one of these two you have chosen to take the place in this ministry and apostleship from which Judas turned aside to go to his own place." And they cast lots for them, and the lot fell on Matthias, and he was numbered with the eleven apostles.

SERMON

Tomorrow is Memorial Day. It is the day that we set aside each year as a nation to remember the men and women who have given their lives to keep our country free. Memorial Day is not nearly so much a celebration as it is a commemoration. Memorial Day reminds us of the true cost of freedom. As the saying goes, "Freedom isn't free". It comes at a great cost.

In our nation's first 100 years of existence, over 683,000 Americans lost their lives, with the Civil War accounting for over 90% of the total. We compare that to the next 100 years when an additional 626,000 died through two world wars, Korea, Vietnam, several regional conflicts, and the Middle East.

Those are the official numbers taken from the U.S. Army Military History Institute. That's over 1.3 million American lives sacrificed for our freedom and the freedom of others around the world. It is because of their sacrifice that we are able to sit here in our homes today as free men and women. They died for our country so that we can have the freedom to live, freedom to make our own decisions, and freedom to worship. We are humbled by their sacrifice.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt said: "Those who have long enjoyed such privileges as we enjoy forget in time that men have died to win them."

This weekend, and tomorrow in particular, thousands of Americans will make pilgrimages to cemeteries across our land to remember loved ones lost. They will decorate their graves with flowers. But all of us, as Americans should take time to remember that the freedoms we enjoy are owed to the brave men and women who have died in service to our country, and to those who are serving today. Because of them, we can freely proclaim the Word of God. We have the right to live at peace in our homes. We have the rights of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

Remembering is to be a common spiritual exercise in our lives as Christians. Time and again the people of God are exhorted and commanded to remember. Over 100 times the word "remember" is mentioned in scripture. More than once God has instituted memorials so His people would remember. We have the giving of a Rainbow as a remembrance that God will never again flood the earth. That's Genesis 9. We have the Passover in Numbers 9. Remembering that the angel of death passed over the homes that had the blood of a lamb on the doorposts. We have the stones from the Jordan River in Joshua 4, plus a number of other rituals and sacrifices. All given with the element of remembrance. Our devotion tomorrow will focus on remembering.

But tomorrow as we celebrate Memorial Day, I want you to remember more than just the men and women who gave the ultimate sacrifice that we might be one nation under God. I also ask that you make tomorrow a reminder of what Jesus did for us. I want tomorrow to be a reminder to us of the cost of freedom for our Christian life.

You are free from the consequences of sin and the fear of death today because Jesus, God's only Son, became one of us. He gave His life so we could have ours spared. We who've come to faith in Jesus by the power of the Holy Spirit owe to Him all glory and praise for what He did for us. Don't take for granted the great salvation that we have today!

Only God knows how many have had their blood shed for the cause of Christ in the last two thousand years. It's fitting for us this morning to likewise remember their sacrifice. It is still, more fittingly, and important for us to remember the One in whom they believed. The one who shed the purity of His blood for freedom's cause. For without the sacrifice of our Risen Lord, we in America would not enjoy the freedoms we love and know so well.

For us, as believers in Jesus, every Sunday is a memorial to our Lord Jesus Christ. Because He gave His life for us, we can have freedom from sin and eternal life with Him. We celebrate Memorial Day once a year as a nation, but every week we hold a memorial of Christ. Every Sunday is Memorial Day for the Christian.

In our memorial to Christ, we mourn His loss, we remember His life, and we are thankful for His sacrifice. We are to examine our responsibility to Christ. It is because of our sins that He had to die on the cross. Romans 3:23 says that all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God. We must recognize that we are as much to blame as the Jews who cried out for His crucifixion. He was humiliated, beaten, spit upon, and hung on the cross because we have sinned. We must recognize that He would have died to save even just one sinner. That is how great His love for us is.

Matthew 18:12-14 reads, "Jesus died so that we could all have the chance at eternal life. He did it freely and willingly. He died to defeat sin once and for all that it would no longer reign over us, but that through the blood of Christ, we could have righteousness."

To the church in Rome Paul wrote in chapter 6:3-4, "Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life."

And then he goes on to say, "So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus. Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, to make you obey its passions. Do not present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and your members to God as instruments for righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace."

And he concludes by saying, "But now that you have been set free from sin and have become slaves of God, the fruit you get leads to sanctification and its end, eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

NUMBER TWO: We Remember His Life. What must we remember about Jesus? We remember how He lived and what He taught. He set a glorious example of how to live life through love. Our lives, in Him, are to reflect that love. Jesus lived a life that is full of instruction for us. He showed love to everyone He came into contact with. He healed the sick. He raised the dead. He taught by example how to live a righteous life before God. He experienced pain, hunger, loneliness, temptation, joy, happiness, and all of the other emotions that we experience. He did this so that we would have a sympathetic High Priest, who understands what we are going through because He also experienced it. He came to serve. Our lives in Christ are to be marked by service as well.

Matthew 20:28 "The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." If He came to serve, what must we do? I will share with you two contrasting views of service.

"I gave a little party this afternoon at three 'Twas very small Three guests in all Just I, Myself, and Me Myself ate up the sandwiches While I drank up the tea And it was I who ate the pie And passed the cake to Me."

That's the way it is for some people. It's not just me first, it is me alone. This is the way it is with most folks. But because we're in Christ and Christ is in us, we think about others!

Lord, help me to live from day to day In such a self-forgetful way That even when I kneel to pray My prayer shall be for others.

Help me in all the work I do To ever be sincere and true And know that all I'd do for you Must needs be done for others. Let "self" be crucified and slain And buried deep, and all in vain May efforts be to rise again Unless to live for others.

And when my work on earth is done And my new work in heaven's begun May I forget the crown I've won While thinking still of others.

Others, Lord, yes, others Let this my motto be, Help me to live for others That I may live like Thee.

We are Thankful for His Sacrifice. The price Jesus paid on the cross has afforded us salvation. We have the promise of salvation and we did nothing to deserve it. That is the definition of grace: unmerited favor. For this we are thankful. Look at Hebrews 9:11-13, "But when Christ appeared as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and more perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation) he entered once for all into the holy places, not by means of the blood of goats and calves but by means of his own blood, thus securing an eternal redemption. For if the blood of goats and bulls, and the sprinkling of defiled persons with the ashes of a heifer, sanctify for the purification of the flesh, how much more will the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered himself without blemish to God, purify our conscience from dead works to serve the living God."

NUMBER THREE: Now here's the question: What will our memorial be? When people remember you, just what will they remember first? What will they remember the most? How will others summarize the life you lived?

Our influence doesn't end when we die. It lives on in the lives of those we have touched. The Bible clearly teaches that our influence continues after we are gone. Just look at the examples of faithful service given in Hebrews 11. These lived many, many years ago, yet they are still influencing our lives today by the example that they gave.

We can all look back on our lives and remember people who have influenced our lives. We will all influence the lives of others, and especially our children and grandchildren. Our influence will live on in them for generations to come. What kind of influence will that be? Will it be a good influence or a bad influence? The decisions and actions we take today, will influence lives for years to come. We all need to ask ourselves this question: What influences am I setting in motion which for each of us. What kind of legacy will we leave behind?
